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Chamber Alliance Vision Statement Plots Mohawk Valley's Future for Two Decades

There is hope for the future. For your future, and for your neighbor's future. And for your kids' futures.

There can be job creation — for young and old, in labor and in the professions — in the Mohawk Valley...soon, as in the immediate future, and lasting for the next 20 years, at least.

The same can be said about enhancement of the region's quality of life for all...now, and during the next two decades.

These are among the conclusions in "A Regional Vision Statement for the Mohawk Valley," produced by the Chamber Alliance of the Mohawk Valley and released to the public in early November.

It is a document that should be embraced and promoted by all within the business community. If properly supported by those in business, it can have an immediate effect upon the regional economy and create long-term benefits.

What makes this report sub-titled, "New Directions from the People," so special? First, it was developed and unanimously supported by members of the Chamber Alliance (Boonville, Herkimer County, Marcy, Mohawk Valley, New Hartford, Rome Area, Trenton and Westmoreland Area) which represent over 3,000 area businesses.

Second, it was endorsed by noted urban government expert David Rusk.

Third, many of its recommendations require a change in attitude more than the spending of money. Such changes can create enormous economic development opportunities as well as positive emotional outlooks in residents.

And fourth, it is a regional statement, not a provincial plan that can benefit only a small segment of the Mohawk Valley's society. Its ramifications are so great, so widespread, someone could enjoy a successful and long-term political career simply by promoting the recommendations and vowing to implement them.

The Vision Statement recommendations center around this quote by Curtis Johnson of the CityStates Group: "Livability is becoming the new fundamental standard for economic *Continued on Page 3*



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December: Open Enrollment in Health Care Choices Plans

December is the month for Chamber members to make decisions regarding their health care coverages for it is Open Enrollment month for the Health Care Choices program.

Members with 50 and fewer employees are eligible to participate.

During December, qualifying members may enroll in a health care insurance program, change coverages, or add employees to the program. Coverage is effective January 1, 2002.

If your business qualifies, it may enroll in the Chamber plan at rates traditionally lower than those available to "direct pay" members.

Chambers Make Many Recommendations For Future Regional Growth and Prosperity


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development. Companies do not go to places that are not livable anymore. People refuse to go to places and work in places that are not livable."

Thus we need to enhance our assets, become more livable than we already are, to attract more business.

Top recommendations are to grow leading assets such as higher education and arts and cultural affairs.

There are 10 institutions of higher education with 20,000 students within 20 miles of downtown Utica. There are 70 members of the CNY Community



Arts Council, including Munson-Williams-Proctor Institute.

Also we need to overcome a weakness, a lack of self-promotion. Hence, we tell the world the heart of higher education and arts/cultural affairs in Upstate NY is the Mohawk Valley.


We need to take advantage of tourism assets. Eco-tourism is the industry's top growth area for the next decade and the Harbor Point Plan calls for Phase One being the enhancement of Utica Marsh. With an entrance off Genesee Street, less than a mile from the Thruway, it has the potential to attract at least 100,000 eco-tourists annually. "It could be your area's answer to Chattanooga's Tennessee Riverwalk," Rusk said.

He also liked the recommendation that we learn by studying the success stories of other areas.

"You have everything in place," he said. "You have business poised to try to make change. You have the Vision Statement, the Genesis Group that could act as an advocacy group for the Chamber Alliance. Now you need the will to push for these changes."

If business supplies that will, the future is bright, indeed.

Brian R. Loughlin, Senior Vice President and Commercial Lending Officer for the Bank of Utica.


John J. Livingston, senior partner in the firm Getnick, Livingston, Atkinson, Gigliotti & Priore, LLP.



Storrier is the former General Manager at WKTV and a past director who is Publicity Council Chairman. He and his wife, Mary Jane, live in New Hartford.


Sweet, is a member of the Audit and Finance Committee. She resides in Clinton with her husband and two children.


